The Word of God

Dale

Written near the end of the first century the book of Acts, written by the same author as the gospel of Luke, tells the story of the expansion of the Church. The narrative that is our first reading comes after the story of the healing of a lame man by Peter at Jerusalem's Temple gate. Addressing those who witness the event gives Peter the opportunity to tell the people of the death and resurrection of Jesus. It is a call to those listening to change their ways (to repent) and believe in the one who makes lame persons whole. A reading from Acts, chapter 3, verses 12-19

Peter addressed the people, "You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made this man walk? The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses.

And by faith in his name, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you see and know; and the faith that is through Jesus has given him this perfect health in the presence of all of you. And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. In this way God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, that his Messiah would suffer. Repent therefore, and turn to God so that your sins may be wiped out."

PSALM 4 Ruth

REFRAIN The Lord does wonders for the faithful.

Answer me when I call, O God, defender of my cause; you set me free when I am hard-pressed; have mercy on me and hear my prayer.

"You mortals, how long will you dishonour my glory; how long will you worship dumb idols and run after false gods?" R

Know that the Lord does wonders for the faithful; when I call upon the Lord, he will hear me. Tremble, then, and do not sin; speak to your heart in silence upon your bed. R

You have put gladness in my heart, more than when grain and wine and oil increase. I lie down in peace; at once I fall asleep; for only you, Lord, make me dwell in safety.

As last Sunday our second reading on this Third Sunday of Easter is from the first letter of John. It was likely written at the end of the first century by an unknown author. The community appears to have recently experienced some conflict and division, and continues to face a skeptical public. In this short passage the writer encourages the community of believers to live lives that reflect the life of Jesus, that they may 'abide in him' the righteous one. A reading from 1 John, chapter 3

See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. And all who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure. Everyone who commits sins is guilty of lawlessness; sin is lawlessness. You know that he was revealed to take away sins, and in him there is no sin. No one who abides in him sins; no one who sins has either seen him or known him. Little children, let no one deceive you. Everyone who does what is right is righteous, just as he is righteous.
